

Policy Statement

1. All bachelor's degree candidates must successfully complete all remedial requirements before earning 30 credits at Fort Lewis College in courses numbered 100 and above.

Reason for Policy

- 1. State Mandate: *Developmental Policy* (Section I) requires, among other things, that all state-supported institutions of higher education "shall ensure that developmental students who place into college-level English and Mathematics courses with SAI, or place into non-college level developmental education, complete the sequent college level English and Mathematics course(s) required of their programs within the student's first 30 semester credits."
- 2. State Mandate: *Supplemental Academic Instruction* (Section I, Part W) requires institutions to require "students placed into SAI complete their SAI requirements by the time the student completes thirty college-level credit hours" (5.01.04).

Consequences for Not Following Policy

Failure to successfully meet the policy requirement will result in a schedule lock. Students will be enrolled in the entry level CO1 course and/or MA1 (MATH 105) course and co-requisite SAI in the subsequent semester.

Definitions

Bachelor's Degree Candidate: Undergraduate students pursuing their first bachelor's degree and post-baccalaureate students pursuing a second or subsequent, non-duplicative, bachelor's degree who are attending less than half time, half time, three quarters time, or full time.
