PROJECTS

Outdoor Learning Pavilion

Sneak peak! Our outdoor learning pavilion—which we are affectionately referring to as our Sky Pavilion—is coming to life. We've received design plans from Reynolds Ash + Associates, the contracted architecture firm. The pavilion features a classroom area (with a whiteboard and projection system) and expanded space for performances and gatherings (seating 100 people). One of the external walls features a mural that can be repainted by students or visiting artists. The space around the pavilion will become our Indigenous garden; a group has started to plan these garden elements. Designs are still being tweaked, funds being raised, and ideas developed. First Generation Support

Dean Jesse Peters has been working with Dean Jeff Dupont, TRIO, Career Services, and the Academic Hub to consolidate access to support for first generation students at FLC. They will develop a web portal for easy access to programming and support services. Additionally, Dean Peters was awarded a \$5000 grant from Alpine Bank to start a faculty and staff support team for first generation students. Look for announcements over the summer and as we approach the fall semester.

Animas High School

The School of Education will be collaborating in greater depth with Animas High School. "BULLET BRIEF" FROM THE DEANS:

What exciting work is underway in departments and programs this month?

School of Arts & Sciences: Dean Peters shares this month's updates:

- Celebrating the launch of the new Performing Arts Department, our Music and Theatre faculty and students held a fantastic Performing Arts Extravaganza in the Concert Hall on April 22. The event includes dance performances, small chamber ensembles, jazz band, choir, orchestra, a scene from *Sweeney Todd*, a scene from *Romeo and Juliet*, among many others.
- The SkyWords Common Read Author event has been rescheduled to fall. Pulitzer Prize Winner Natalie Diaz, author of *Postcolonial Love Poem*, is our featured Common Read author and will now be joining us in the fall, with her reading rescheduled to September 13. This will be a great way to kick off the fall semester.

School of Business Administration: Dean Elias shares this month's updates:

- As the semester comes to an end, SOBA will be recognizing students who have gone "above and beyond" this year. The Student Awards Ceremony will be held May 5, 1:00-2:00pm in the EBH Atrium.
- SOBA will also be celebrating its first graduating class from the Computer Information Systems program.
- The Fennell-Saegert Student Marketing Agency program will be held this summer, May 23-July 8. Dedicating 40 hours a week to the program, student consultants will work with Ska Brewing company to develop two new products to add to their line of beverages (one non-alcoholic and one alcoholic). We hope to see FLC student-recommended Ska beverages in stores.

School of Education: Dean Trujillo shares this month's updates:

• The Southwest Indigenous Language Development Institute (SILDI) students from the three Ute tribes (Southern Ute, Ute Mountain Ute, and Northern Ute) presented teaching lessons 100% in Ute language this past Saturday, May 30 at FLC. Students are working toward a certificate to teach Ute language in community or school settings.

- Teacher Education students completing licensure at the both the graduate and undergraduate levels will celebrate their student teaching experiences in a Professional Exhibition on May 12 at 5:00pm in the ballroom. Area educators, alumni, family and friends will be in attendance.
- The first FLC cohort of educators earning a Master of Arts in Education: Principal Licensure will graduate at spring commencement adding 18 new school leaders to the Four Corners, as well as New Mexico and the Front Range.
- Students in Adventure Education presented a Senior Poster session in Adventure Education Program Planning and Design. View the posters at the Undergraduate Research Symposium.

- <u>Accessibility in Canvas with Ally</u>. You can improve the accessibility of your course using Ally, an accessibility checker integrated into Canvas.
