Successful HLC (Higher Learning Commission) "Quality Initiative": Retention Innovation

This summer, as part of our mandatory HLC accreditation cycle, we submitted a Quality Initiative proposal that details our strategic planning for retention—and it received a very positive review with no revisions. Our project focuses on integrating our innovative approaches to retention, such as our Academic Care Team. Our comprehensive Retention Innovation plan is attached.

Selection to AASCU Student Success Equity Intensive

We are thrilled that FLC has been selected to participate in a national initiative designed to close equity gaps in higher education completion for students of color and low-income students. Funded by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) has designed a two-year Student Success Equity Intensive program. The Intensive focuses on collecting and analyzing student success data, sharing student success best practices, and working with each institution to design programs aimed at erasing equity gaps.

RENAMING of FLC "CENTERS"

At FLC, our student support offices are often referred to as "services" (such as Teaching & Learning Services). However, national higher ed practice is using the terminology of "centers." In addition, our FLC students are acclimated to the centers phrasing used in the Student Union. As a result, our services offices have asked to be re-named as centers—please recognize and use these new titles.

Accessibility Resource Center

The Disability Services office is implementing its new name as our "Accessibility Resource Center." The Accessibility Resource Center provides academic accommodations, modifications, and

adjustments, and assistive technologies. The Accessibility Resource Center has seen increasing numbers of students needing support, and plays a crucial role in our Community of Care. Now located in 071 Reed Library, it is aligned with the Academic Hub's emphasis on academic support.

Teaching & Learning Center

Teaching & Learning Services will update its name to our "Teaching & Learning Center." The Center provides faculty teaching development, learning design for accessibility, Canvas course support, and student success analytics. During COVID, the amazing Teaching & Learning team's inventive work to shift our teaching online ensured our success. They are now building on that success with new forms of distance education course development. This new name signals this exciting next phase.

Career & Life Design Center

Career Services has repositioned itself as a "Career & Life Design Center" in the Academic Hub. The Career & Life Design Center connects career planning to a larger focus on a student's life trajectory: what are their strengths, interests, dreams—and how can a career help them to achieve their life aspirations? Look forward to more information on the Career & Life Design Center's programs.

CIRCL: Center for Indigenous Research, Culture, and Language

We've created a new CIRCL space! This past spring, FLC was awarded two Mellon grants emphasizing social justice pedagogy—one focusing on expanding our Native American & Indigenous Studies Department and one focusing on creating a "All Our Nations Language Revitalization Hub." In addition, our Southwest Indigenous Language Development Institute (SILDI) has worked with the Southern Ute Tribe to offer an incredibly successful series of courses on the Ute Language. At the same time, our CSWS has worked with Curatorial Fellow Elise Boulanger to emphasize the importance of student-led exhibitions enacting our reconciliation work. All of this crucial work needs a physical space, allowing it to connect, grow, and thrive. We've dedicated the Jones 105/140 area to this work, giving it the CIRCL name. Look forward to a grand opening next month!

EXCEL: Experiential and Community Engaged Learning Center

Our Academic Hub will include a new EXCEL Center—this makes clear our commitment to hands-on active learning and our commitment to community-serving programming. As announced last week, Drs. Becky Clausen and Deb Powers will lead this donor-funded space. The EXCEL Center will support place-based and purpose-driven learning. As it develops, we will share EXCEL Center planning.

"GOOD NEWS" PROJECTS

What impressive initiatives are faculty and staff engaged in, ranging from conference presentations to classroom innovations to student projects?

Department of Energy Award for Undergraduate Energy Research

Under the leadership of Dr. Kenny Miller, Professor of Chemistry, FLC has received a \$190,000 subaward from the Department of Energy to fund research on clean energy technologies. This subaward is part of a collaboration of more than 20 scientists in labs across the country that was awarded \$10.6 million to establish an Energy Frontier Research Center and a "Ensembles of Photosynthetic Nanoreactors" project. This grant will fund summer research stipends for at least nine FLC undergraduate students to study new catalysts to produce clean hydrogen fuel from water and sunlight during the next four years. FLC will work closely with Prof. Justin Sambur at Colorado State University (CSU), and FLC students will travel to CSU each summer to see their catalysts in action. Funding for travel to national conferences, supplies and materials, and equipment is also included in the award. Congratulations, Dr. Miller!
